What was happening one hundred and fifty years ago as the new year of 1874 was beginning?

According to the County Clerk's public records, on Saturday, January 3, 1874, Pantation (aka Pantaleon) Herrera, widower of Marina Ramires, filed a petition appointing his mother Juliana Gallagher (aka Gallegos) as the guardian of his four-year-old daughter Josefa Herrera.

Makes one wonder what caused Pantaleon to file such a petition? Was he sick? Having to seek life elsewhere? What did 1874 bring to him and his family?

#### 2023 - A Year In Review

Our Society members can take pride in all of the Society's accomplishments in 2023. Here are the major highlights.

She thought the Opries were not enough, so she went even further and produced two *Western Shindigs* and, with her team, brought in thousands more dollars for the Jailhouse project. While restoration is not yet fully complete, the County Jailhouse Museum opened its doors for regular and special, paranormal tours. Tara Lee, the Museum Director, also held the museum's grand reopening attended by several descendants of former County sheriffs who once lived in the Jailhouse.

Gracing the entrance to the newly-opened Jailhouse Museum are engraved memorial bricks which continues to be fundraising project led by our fundraising committee members Neila Hopkins and Viola Henke.

Sarah Gella spent many hours coordinating and overseeing special events held at the historic Dewees-Remschel house.

A historical marker dedication ceremony for Dr Ella Ware, a memorial day ceremony for Obie Walker, and several Texas Ranger Cross ceremonies were also organized and conducted by our Society members.

Join us at our monthly meeting to learn about Casa Navarro, a National Historic Landmark and a State Historic site as well as the history of the famed Navarro family of Bexar. Our guest speaker is Belinda Gavallos, the President, Friends of Casa Navarro. Wish Belinda Mora Gavallos is a daughter of San Antonio eleven generations deep. She has a family history originating from the founding families of the Canary Islands and the first Navarro to arrive from Corsica.

Belinda earned her degree in Business Administration from Texas A&M University in College Station and has spent her career as a fine arts professional curating and consulting both for private clients and institutions.

Belinda serves as Executive Director of the San Antonio Women's Chamber of Commerce, President, Friends of Casa Navarro, and is the incoming Chair of the Bexar County Historical Commission. Belinda is a member of the Conservation Society of San Antonio and a member of the coalition of community advocates trying to save the Texas Pavilion (Institute of Texan Cultures on the Hemisfair grounds).

Belinda is a member of the Canary Islands Descendants Association and the Daughters of the Republic of Texas.

## **NEW MUSEUM EXHIBIT**

The Wilson County Jailhouse Museum opened its new exhibit on January 13th. *Wilson County Agriculture History* is an exhibition to aid visitors in learning about the crops and livestock that once were, and many continue to be, raised in the area, starting with the Canary Islanders established their ranches in the area.


